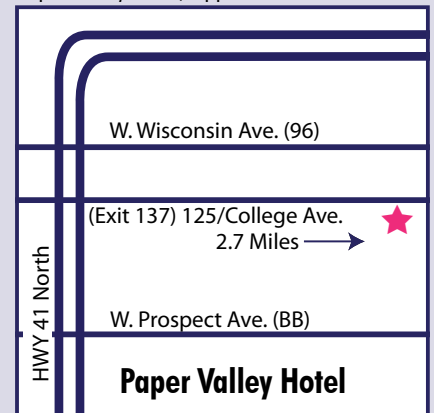

## General Sessions

### Jobsite Fall Protection Ideas and Techniques

This hands-on session will focus on construction related falls. Little has changed in fall protection requirements, but there are a lot of incorrect methods in use and alternative options that could be used to improve worker fall protection on a jobsite. ### OSHA's Lead Standard

For all occupational exposure to lead occurring in the course of construction work, the standard does not specify a minimum amount or concentration of lead that triggers a determination that lead is present and the potential for occupational exposure exists. OSHA is aware that in many instances in the construction industry the exposure assessment required under this standard will not be completed until after lead operations have begun or even ended. This session will discuss the need for interim protective measures, including provision of respirators, protective clothing and equipment, hygiene facilities, training, and biological monitoring for the different lead-related tasks/operations.
